


Resident Spotlight

F-1 Engine

Al Cook

Palm Village resident Al Cook was raised on a working ranch in Twin Oaks Valley, approximately ten miles north of Escondido, California, with his parents, Clinton and Mildred, older sister Carolyn, and younger brother Gordon. The 160-acre ranch included 10,000 turkeys, lemons, and avocados sold to support their family. Their land and their hard-working efforts provided a sustainable household with cows for milk and butter, chickens for meat and eggs, steers and hogs, and a large vegetable and fruit garden. Oak trees were cut and processed for heating their home, as well as his maternal grandparents who lived on the ranch.

Al's family attended Emmanuel Faith Community Church in Escondido, where at the age of ten he accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as his personal savior. In 1948, when he was 13 years of age, he saw a beautiful, freckled-faced, red-haired young girl who was destined to become his lifetime partner, Shirley Nordahl, who was two years younger. They had a storybook relationship as they grew up together and were married seven years later.

Aiming For The

Before marriage, Al attended Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, pursuing an education in engineering. He stopped his education for a year and a half to save money to marry Shirley. After they married, they worked another two years, saving the funds necessary to continue Al's education at Northrup Institute of Technology, where he received his degree in aeronautical engineering and a minor in aircraft maintenance. During that time, he received his private pilot's license and other licenses necessary to work on aircraft.

Al is a renaissance man of broad talents and expertise. He and his team's highly classified successes and failures in aeronautic engineering were followed by

Presidents, Astronauts, and Congress. The space race with Russia was pressuring the advancement of unimagined technologies, that at its very core was a life and death endeavor for the men who were chosen to be space pioneers to the moon.

Al and Shirley Cook

In 1961, Al started working as a junior engineer for General Dynamics Astronautics at Sycamore Canyon Atlas ballistic missile test facility in Poway, California, where he entered the world of rockets and space exploration. For the next six years, Al worked on materials, mechanisms, and forces unknown to most of mankind. In 1962, during a test firing, an Atlas missile on his assigned "test site" experienced an engine failure, resulting in a massive explosion and the complete destruction of the missile, test stand, and site, including broken windows in the town of Santee, 15 miles away.



In July 1962, Al went to work for North American Aviation, Rocketdyne Division as a test engineer. Rocketdyne had a large test facility in the mountains west of the San Fernando Valley. Now a family of three with the birth of their daughter Holly, they moved to an area of Simi Valley. While living there, their son Stuart was born in 1964. Al's initial duties were to conduct "hot fire" calibration testing of the Mercury and Gemini earth orbiting capsule "positioning" rocket engines for function and propellants. After completing those projects, he was responsible for designing, testing, modifying, and maintaining the test stands for the testing of components for the F-1 engines for the Apollo rocket's first stage. After a couple of years, Al transferred to another large test site as the "engineer in charge" that would test liquid oxygen and liquid hydrogen propellent fuel pumps for the Apollo and Nerva projects. He was then transferred as the primary engineer, where he and his team tested and developed the J-2 rocket engines that were used to propel the second and third stages of the Apollo rocket into Earth's orbit, and then escape Earth's gravitational field. After completing Apollo engine testing, AI was assigned testing responsibilities of the liquid propellant rocket engines for the Space Shuttles and other large rocket engines.

Al became acquainted with many of the Apollo and Shuttle Astronauts who became friends, as they visited the facilities to observe the testing of engines that would take them on their missions around the earth, moon, and back. The success of the mission and their lives depended on the reliability of the engines and associated systems.

In the spring of 1967, lay-offs had begun in earnest when the liquid rocket engines for the Apollo and Shuttle programs had been tested and delivered to NASA. Al looked for less stressful employment opportunities and secured a job at the New Holland division of Sperry Rand Corporation in Fowler, California. Al, Shirley and their children Holly and Stuart moved to Kingsburg. Al was hired to design several models of automatic "bale wagons" used for picking up baled hay from the fields and stacking them for storage as well as the engineering prototype shop manager, where all new designs became functioning equipment for field-testing prior to manufacturing. In 1982, Sperry moved all manufacturing to Nebraska and New Holland, Pennsylvania. Deciding as a family not to move, Al began working at Klippenstein Manufacturing and Salwasser Manufacturing companies in Reedley, designing high speed, automated packaging equipment.

Upon retirement in 1999, Shirley and Al moved to Central Colorado to start a two-plus year project of building a home on a ridge of 28 acres of beautiful virgin mountain forest. In 2017, due to Shirley's health, they decided that they needed to be closer to family and medical assistance and moved back to Kingsburg. Shirley passed away in January, 2022 into the arms of her Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ

> Al is still working on his daughter Holly and son-in-law Walt Lehrman's ranch, a large tree fruit operation near Reedley. He spends his days on a tractor or

whatever else needs tending on the ranch, while living in his patio home at Palm Village near friends and family.

Although there are many things to love about Palm Village Retirement, I think most would agree that the best thing about living here is the community itself. Palm Village offers activities and outings designed for seniors to make the most out of every day. The activities calendar is diverse and includes varied interests for anyone looking for something to do or learn. The activities staff provide daily activities, crafts, documentaries, parties, travel, and provide friendship for the residents who live in our community and so much more. These friendly teams of people are active on and off campus with our residents. The Independent Living, Assisted Living, and Memory Care activity staff is coordinated by Sonja Duffy, a six-year employee of Palm Village, and Gonzo Huaracho, a 28-year employee in the Health Care Center.

What Sonja labels as the Department of Happiness, she views that the most important part of the job is to connect with the residents. And this she does with the help of Amalia, Barbara, Jocelyn, and Alexandra. The team provides daily activities, crafts, and socialization for residents to choose from, and most days start with an exercise class in the lower level.

Residents have a great interest in learning new things. Active seniors enjoy a wide range of exercise and hobbies to stay mentally and physically fit. The best

way to exercise the brain is to learn new things. And consistent physical activity is essential for maintaining good health and one of the benefits is that it can delay health issues that come along with age. Sonja has noticed that those who participate in regular exercise tend to be more involved with activities and socialization. A Harvard Study on broader social interactions in seniors noted a strong social life beyond a senior's usual social circle of family and close friends were more likely to have higher levels of physical activity, greater positive moods, and fewer negative feelings. Seniors who have more variety in their social interactions spend less time sedentary.

One of the bonuses to retirement is the time to have hobbies and travel. Crafts provide enrichment and when you're crafting, you are creating! Besides keeping busy, crafting brings residents together and form friendships.

Palm Village provides leisure activities which include physical, cognitive, and social activities. The offerings vary based on resident input, as well as the research provided by the teams on new activities, hobbies, and games. After many years, Sonja was able to reconnect with her love of painting and hosts a monthly painting party for residents. It brings her much joy to see the talent that resides on campus. And while some are new to painting, each person brings their own talents and abilities. There are also monthly lunches out, day trips around California, card-making crafts, chapel services, movies, and documentaries, just to name a few. Each week the team bakes something special to serve at Barbara's as a treat for Assisted Living residents, which also provides for additional opportunities to connect with the residents.
