They dedicated their lives to the noble profession of teaching, and each of them has a unique story, a tapestry woven from years of experience, challenges, and triumphs. They found immense satisfaction in their work, knowing they made a lasting impact on the lives of countless students and their stories of perseverance and commitment continue to inspire new generations of educators.

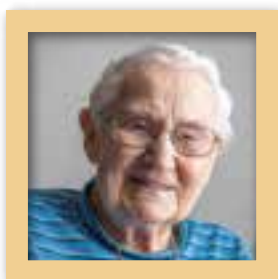
Their stories are a testament to the enduring power of education. We celebrate the teachers who worked in a career that demands so much, and yet gives back with seeing their extraordinary impact on the world.

Preschool Teachers and Administrators – Preschool teachers play a pivotal role in the early development of children. They provide the first formal educational experiences that young children encounter. They are nurturers, guides, and the first point of contact with structured learning.



Lillian Witzel – Lillian's teaching journey is a remarkable tale of dedication and adaptability. Unlike many educators, she began her career in the unique setting of a one-room schoolhouse, instructing students across eight different grades.

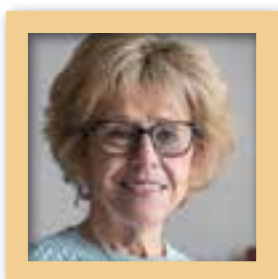
This rare experience laid a strong foundation for her subsequent role in early childhood education. For the next three decades, Lillian served as a Pre-School Director, with a significant twenty-five-year tenure at the Butler MB Church in Fresno. Her passion for nurturing the minds of young learners aged 2 to 5 years old left an indelible mark on countless lives. The cherished connections she formed with her students have endured over the years, highlighted by her attendance at a former student's wedding just last March—a testament to the lasting relationships she's built through her love of teaching.



Alma Elrich – Alma was the Director of Preschool and played a pivotal role in the development of educational programs, meticulous oversight of staff, and astute management of financial resources. Her experience was instrumental in equipping

both the preschool staff and students with the skills and knowledge necessary for a foundation in lifelong learning. Under her guidance, the preschool flourished, becoming a nurturing ground for the young minds entrusted to its care.

Elementary Teachers – The most important years of building the basics of learning in various subjects and teamwork happens in Elementary School. Elementary teachers lay the groundwork for lifelong learning and achievement.



Sharon Duerksen – Sharon's dedication to education shone brightly during her 33 years as a first-grade teacher, with a significant tenure at Washington Elementary School in Reedley. Her exceptional teaching methods and commitment to her students

were recognized when she was honored as Teacher of the Year by the Kings Canyon School District in 1994. Renowned for her engaging classroom, Sharon was the teacher every parent hoped their child would have. Her passion for teaching was palpable, and she often shared endearing anecdotes with her students. One such memorable moment was when she discussed the four food groups in class. Upon querying her students about a potential fifth group, one astute pupil responded with the suggestion: "Leftovers!"



Rosalie Nickel – Rosalie's aspiration to become a teacher started in 2nd-grade. The majority of her 34-year teaching career was spent in the United States, however, her teaching path also took her abroad to South India for a period of three years. There,

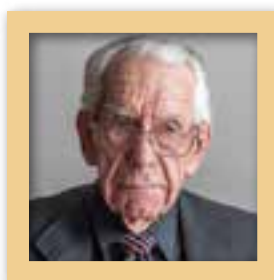
she taught children of Americans living in India, enriching the lives of those who, by virtue of their upbringing, held education in high esteem.

When she and her husband Ted moved to California, Rosalie was known for her commitment to teaching in some of Fresno's most challenging schools. These institutions were melting pots of diverse cultures, where students often faced complex and difficult circumstances at home. Rosalie worked to provide a stable and supportive learning environment for her students, believing in the power of education. Rosalie transitioned into the role of literacy coach where she continued until retirement to mentor both students and teachers.



Linda Nielsen - Linda's 19-year teaching career spanned various grades and schools, including a notable period in Long Beach and a cherished time teaching first grade at Immanuel Elementary School. Her classroom was a vibrant hub

of learning, brought to life by an array of animals she nurtured there. Students were greeted by birds, snakes, fish, bearded dragons, and turtles, all of which contributed to a unique and engaging educational environment.



Stan Huebert – Stan's career in Special Education was marked by his innovative problem-solving skills, which he utilized to enhance the educational experience for students and teachers. As a teacher, he was instrumental in creating the Resource

Specialist Program within the Kings Canyon School District. This program was pivotal in providing essential training across various schools in the district. Beyond teaching, he took on the role of Field Supervisor for Special Education, coordinating a significant program that facilitated the

transportation of mountain-dwelling students to the Diagnostic Scriptive Learning Center located at Jefferson School for specialized education.

Ascending to the position of Assistant to the Superintendent, Stan's responsibilities expanded to include the oversight of nurses, special education programs, counselors, and the Staff Learning Center. His commitment to special education extended to higher education as well, where he shared his knowledge and passion with aspiring educators at Fresno Pacific University for eight years, shaping the next generation of special education professionals.

Teaching Abroad – Several of our teachers also spent time teaching abroad with the unique opportunity to immerse themselves in different cultures while contributing to the betterment and education of students around the world.



Joe Bartell - Joe's teaching career began in the vibrant city of Guadalajara, Mexico, embarking on what would become a fulfilling 40-year career. Joe often reminisces about the early days, feeling honored to have been part of an era when parental support

in education was abundant. This strong foundation of community and collaboration made his initial experience more rewarding.

The majority of Joe's career was spent teaching 2nd and 3rd grades in the small, tight-knit community of Orange Cove. His dedication to his students was evident, and the affection was reciprocated, especially during the holidays when he would be showered with homemade tamales—a heartfelt token of appreciation from the families he served. Joe's passion for athletics led him to coach cross country at Sheridan and T.L. Reed schools. His guidance on the track was impactful. Now, one of Joe's greatest joys comes from chance encounters with former students. These moments, often filled with gratitude and fond memories, serve as a testament to the lasting influence he had on their lives.



Thelma Roach – Thelma, alongside her husband Robert, who was also a dedicated educator, embarked on a noble journey with the Peace Corps. Their service spanned across three countries,

beginning with a year in Egypt, followed by a year in a Romanian orphanage, and culminating with an additional year in Slovakia where Thelma taught English as a Second Language (ESL). It was during their time in Romania that the plight of over 200,000 orphaned children, living in deplorable conditions, came to global attention.

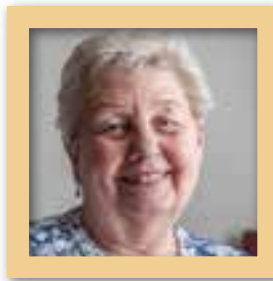
Following their return, Thelma pursued further education, earning a master's degree in Adult Education. She then dedicated the remaining years of her career before retirement to teaching in Sacramento.

Junior High School and High School Teachers – These teachers are pivotal in shaping the academic trajectory and personal development of adolescents.



Claudette Reiser – Claudette's 32-year educational career is a testament to her dedication. She spent many years as the District Coordinator for Junior High teachers, where she provided guidance and support to her colleagues. Her role as the Teacher Advisor for

the Speech & Debate Team and Drama Club allowed her to foster a love for the arts and critical thinking among her students. Taking a sabbatical from teaching, Claudette became the Director of Correspondence for Focus on the Family, where she had the opportunity to work closely with Dr. James Dobson. This diverse experience underscores her commitment to enriching the lives of others through education and communication.



Helena Voss – Helena's 32-year tenure as the English Department Chair at Riverdale High School was fueled by her profound passion for literature. Thriving in the intimate setting of a school with just 400 students, she cherished the vibrancy and diversity of the

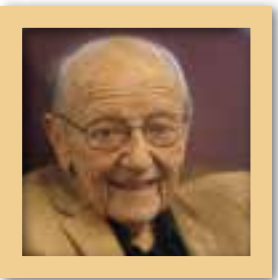
teenage years. Her classroom was a dynamic stage where the works of Shakespeare and Edgar Allan Poe were not merely taught but enacted, with students bringing these timeless stories to life through plays and recitations. More than just an educator, Helena formed enduring friendships with her students, a testament to the lasting impact she made on their lives.



Glen Ewert – Glen was a dedicated educator beginning with Junior High students and transferred to teaching high school, retiring from Roosevelt High School in Fresno, where he imparted knowledge in Government and Economics.

His passion for teaching was matched by his enthusiasm and some would say first love, coaching where he found immense joy in mentoring young athletes. As a wrestling, football, track and field, and golf coach, Glen not only taught the techniques and strategies of the sports but also instilled in his students the values of discipline, teamwork, and perseverance. Sports allowed him to contribute to the development of students' physical abilities and competitive spirit with lessons from sports. Glen went on coaching for an additional five years after retiring from the classroom.

College Professors and Administrators – College professors prepare students for learning, engagement, and career development.



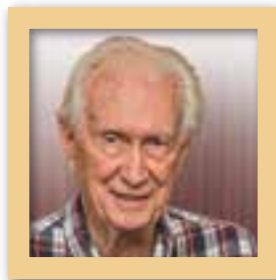
Vernon Janzen – Vernon started his teaching career at Immanuel High School where he became the principal and was also a visiting instructor of psychology at Fresno Pacific University. Thereafter, he became the Dean of Students at Fresno Pacific where he also

taught speech, helping students find their voices and articulate their thoughts. Vernon's commitment to education and leadership led him to a seven-year tenure as President at Tabor College. In this pivotal role, he provided visionary leadership, supervised staff, and hired new faculty who embodied the Christian values of the school. His strategic approach to attracting new students helped Tabor College stand out in the competitive landscape of Christian higher education. Vernon's adeptness at fundraising played a crucial role in raising funds for the financial health of the college. Additionally, the completion of a two-story library was made possible through a building fund of donations and without indebtedness upon its completion. He is proud of the opportunities made available for the spiritual lives of students to explore and deepen their faith.



Ted Nickel – Upon returning from his tenure in teaching and administration in India, Ted earned his doctorate at UCLA. He then embarked on a three-year journey as a psychology professor at the University of Tulsa, followed by a five-year tenure as

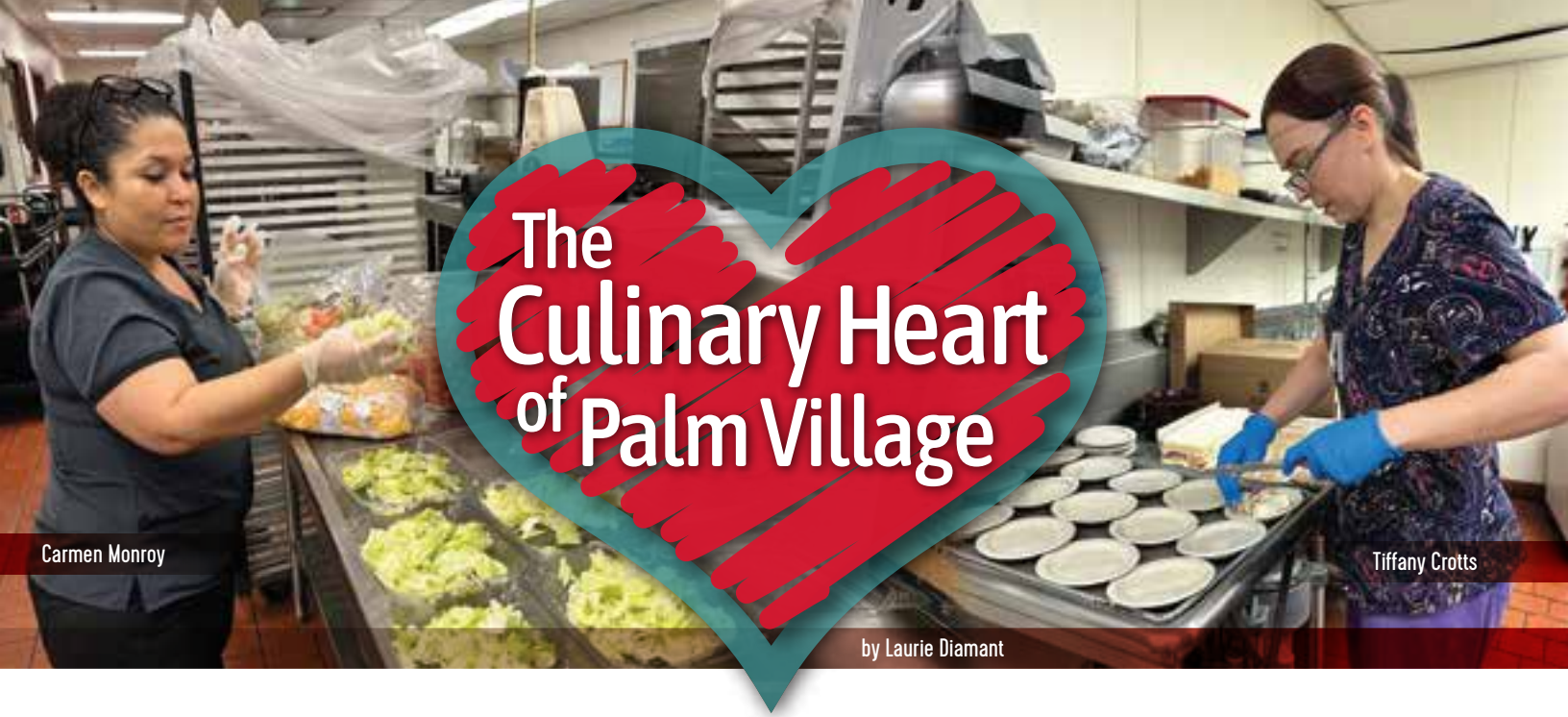
Associate Dean. Seizing a new opportunity, Ted ascended to the role of Vice-President at Tabor College, a position he held for five years. Eventually, he returned to California, where he joined Fresno Pacific University. In total, Ted devoted nearly 24 years to teaching and 14 years to various administrative roles.

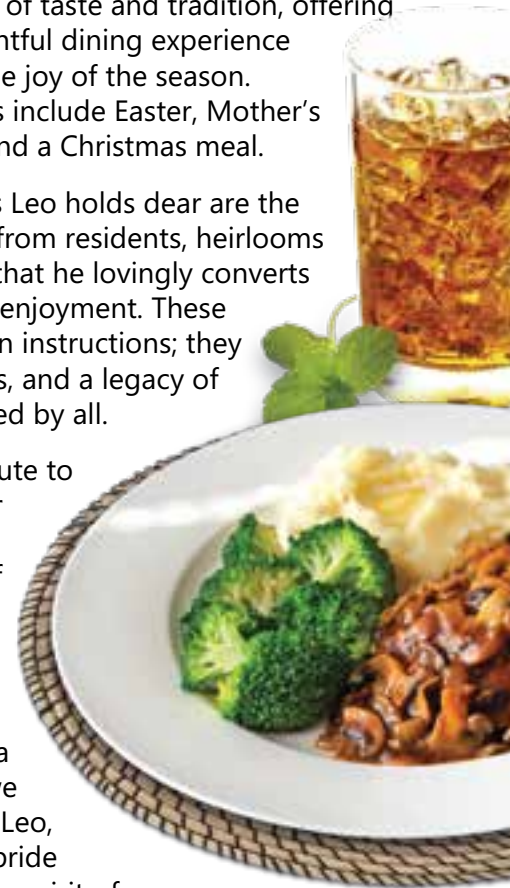
